

I was living with my parents, when my now husband and I fell pregnant. My whole family was very unhappy about it, and they kicked me out. With nowhere to go, we lived in my car. It was the scariest time of my life. I remember crying every day. Even though I was working, we had little money, and I was sick a lot. My husband was struggling to find a job, and we just couldn't afford to rent a private house. I was always worried about the life our baby would be born into.

I went to Work and Income, and after three months they found us temporary emergency accommodation in a hotel. Life was much better than in the car, but we never felt settled because we knew we had to move out before our baby was due. We were stressed about where we'd go, and how

we'd keep our baby healthy. We felt really alone and afraid. After four months in the hotel we had no choice but to move into a house that was way too expensive for us. We were left with just \$10 a week after rent. We had no idea what we were going to do, until our midwife introduced us to Isapella, a Mission social worker.

Having Isapella on our side was such a relief. She gave us culturally-specific food parcels, and cleaning products to stretch our budget. Isapella also started to help us get ready for our baby. She provided important items like hand-knitted blankets, clothes, and a car seat, and even introduced us to Family Start so we could learn skills to be the best parents. Even with all this help, staying in the private rental was not going to work for our family long-term. So Isapella made sure we got on the Housing NZ waiting list, and we reminded them every week that we'd need an affordable house before our baby was born. In April we were so lucky to find our new home, and two months later, along came our beautiful boy!

Now we feel so happy and secure. I'm confident that we are taking care of our boy well, and that he will grow up healthy and safe. After meeting our son, my dad came around too and he loves being part of our life again. We're now fully independent from The Mission's support, but I know we can call Isapella if we ever need to.

It's going to be so special celebrating our son's first Christmas in our own home.

I'm looking forward to going back to work when I can, and studying part-time. My husband has got a passenger driving license, and applied for a taxi. After everything we've been through, it's going to be so special celebrating our son's first Christmas in our own home - we can't wait. What can I say, we just feel so lucky!

It's a privilege to be there for families like this one, through what was an incredibly scary part of their journey. We're so happy that they will have their baby's first Christmas in a safe home, knowing that their future looks so much brighter.

How does Chapman Tripp support The Mission?

Through the work The Mission does, and seeing people less fortunate, I realise how lucky I am. Knowing what's going on for some people in our community makes me feel quite privileged, and it's a reminder how important it is to help others in need.

I was living in Australia two years ago, when one day I came home from work with the most terrible headache. I don't remember anything from that moment on. I'd had an aneurysm, and there was a long road to recovery ahead. I had to learn most things over again, but I couldn't get any support in Australia for living costs.

I came back to NZ with no money and nowhere to go, and I was still really unwell. I reported to Wellington Hospital, and a social worker arranged for me to stay at a boarding house. The next year was a really frightening time, as I stayed at a few different boarding houses while recovering. I was delighted to eventually find my little flat, and I thought things were finally going to be better. But on my budget I just couldn't get by. I was so grateful for what I was

receiving from the government, but after rent and power I wasn't left with much for everything else – like food, cleaning supplies, and expensive healthcare for my recovery. On top of everything, my washing machine broke down, and there was no way I could pay to fix it. It was embarrassing having to go around my new neighbours asking if I could use theirs. I was really struggling to make any progress alone, and I honestly didn't know what to do.

I just felt such support and care from Rowan at a time when I was beginning to accept that my life was going to be an uphill battle. That was when I was introduced to The Mission's Community Services Advocate, Rowan, and my whole life turned around. After chatting about everything I was going through, she organised a meeting with Work and Income immediately. It was a miracle how quickly she was able to get through to them, and then arrange a Supported Living Allowance. She even got a grant for the cost of a new washing machine!

But more than that, I just felt such support and care from Rowan at a time when I was beginning to accept that my life was going to be an uphill battle. Her impact has been life-changing, and not just because I don't have to struggle and stress anymore. I also feel part of society, even just because of little things like being able to afford to knit again.

Now I have so much in life, it just makes me want to cry. I wake up every day, and think to myself "Oh my goodness, this is just amazing!" I want everyone who has helped me to know how grateful I am, and I look forward to giving back however I can.

It's really heart-warming to see how brightly Sylvia is shining now. Sadly we see cases like hers all too often. There are lots of people who are genuinely struggling with the basics, but don't know how to access the support they need to take care of themselves. The Mission can help people get back to enjoying their lives, and become positive and valued members of our community.

In the lead-up to Christmas we're grateful to receive incredible support from across the community, including donations of Christmas food and gifts for kids. Along with providing these to people in need through our own programmes and services, it's also our privilege to share these items with other local social service agencies. Last year we provided support to 38 other agencies including Women's Refuge, Red Cross Refugee Services and Birthright!

We spoke with Birthright CEO Bonnie Mawson to find out how this support makes a difference for the people they work with.

Please tell us about Birthright.

Birthright is a small team working with families that are led by one person. We believe that every child has the right to a good start in life and the opportunity to reach their full potential.

What's Christmas like for the families you're working with?

A lot of our families find Christmas incredibly stressful. They want to provide the best for their kids, as all parents do, but their budgets are already stretched to the limit.



It's heart-breaking for them to see their kids miss out, so they often fall into debt through high interest loans or shopping trucks, just so they can put on a family celebration.

How does The Mission's support help?

The food and presents that The Mission provides mean so much to our families. They're so delighted when we arrive with all the goodies, and many tell us that we've made their Christmas. This support helps them to feel like any other family celebrating Christmas together. It stops them from feeling the need to access loans or other debt, so it leaves them in a much better position going forward as well.

What would you say to those who support The Mission at Christmas and make this possible?

The Wellington community is amazing, and the level of involvement and support is heart-warming. From individuals through to schools, corporates and beyond, we thank you!

We're looking forward to providing food and gifts to agencies like Birthright again this Christmas. We love coordinating this support across the Wellington region. By working together, we're able to have an even greater impact and help more people in need!

COMBATING HYGIENE POVERTY

It was fantastic to partner with Wellington blogger Lucy Revill (The Residents) in July for a hygiene product campaign called Soap For Society.

Lucy created Soap For Society when she realised that there are many Wellingtonians who go without basic toiletries like soap, shampoo and sanitary items because they're unable to afford them.

She put the call out to people and businesses to donate products or funds to The Mission, and we were blown away by the response! In total we received donated products that filled more than 100 crates and boxes, and over \$1,500 in cash donations!

A WORD FROM OLIVIA - COMMUNITY PROGRAMMES MANAGER

Making Christmas a special time of year for everyone really resonates with me. Growing up, we didn't have a heck of a lot of money but we always had something to open on Christmas Day, and a special meal to share.

There's certainly a fair bit of pressure for all of us to be part of that 'Kiwi Christmas'. In reality though, this isn't possible for many people in our community. Families are barely scraping by just trying to maintain the basics. They're trying to pay back massive debts, get through personal challenges, or they have very little means because they are working poor, beneficiaries, or sole parents. Being unable to provide the best possible experience for your children is a heartbreaking thought for parents to live with.

Even though it's a commercial way of looking at Christmas, young kids don't understand it all. As a parent, how do you explain that

your child has been good, but they just won't get something special this year? Under pressure some parents go to loan sharks, which becomes a downward spiral. Others will simply go without, and feel ashamed during what should be a happy time. These pressures can open up cracks in already strained relationships as well, leading to high rates of alcohol and drug abuse, and family violence. On the whole, a family is in danger of heading down an even darker road in the New Year.

But our ambition is that no one will miss out this Christmas. Our social workers are already preparing families for the challenges ahead through financial mentoring, goalsetting, school holiday planning, and personal support. They're even planning the gifts each child will love most. One big thing we believe in, is giving parents unwrapped gifts. That way they have the opportunity to

wrap something themselves to give to their child. It lets the family feel like they are participating in a Kiwi Christmas.

I think this is so important because it gives our community's struggling families a sense of self-worth. Parents are reminded that they can provide for their kids, and they'll create priceless memories together. The Mission can only make this a special time for so many because of the incredible support we receive from generous people across the Wellington region. From gifts that will fulfil a child's wishlist, to food for a special meal and funds to provide the very best support, you make all the difference.
